



Speaking of Travel

at Gaylord's photos of Jordan Valley are truly inspiring. I've got to admit that I look forward to every issue of this magazine just to see what he will come up with based upon his travels! Since Pat was east of the Cascades, I thought I could take the liberty of including a photo I took of an interesting rock formation whilst visiting the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) last April in a journey to watch Sandhill Cranes. What do you see in the picture? What else?



Imagine my surprise to discover that Sandhills don't seem to care about the boundaries of the NWR, in fact, we never saw one within the refuge. They were all comingling with cows on private ranch land. If you've ever searched online for their mating rituals, you'll be taken to various YouTube videos of them performing their entertaining dance in efforts to pair up with a member of the opposite sex. Whilst watching them, two things came to mind. Watching members of the Watusi tribe in Sub-Saharan Africa perform dances in their colorful attire, and standing at the counter in a juke joint here in Oregon watching folks dancing to country and western music! With the changes to the National Flood Insurance program precipitated by the Biggert-Waters Act of 2012 and recent program amendments addressing some of the holes in that attempted reform, surveyor's need to understand the added complexities of the program and prepare for the questions they may be asked by affected homeowners.

I attended a workshop in 2013 led by Christine and the Oregon Dept. of Land Conservation and Development, where she brought together surveyors, planners, lawyers and underwriters in an effort to open dialogues about the changes. It was one of the most informative workshops I've ever attended and not for the reasons you might expect. I seldom perform flood insurance certifications, but my curiosity needed satisfying. Having the disparate perspectives on this program all in the same room opened my eyes to the differing needs for the information a surveyor may supply. It also opened my eyes to how seriously we have overlooked, as a profession, our need for outreach!

There are many allied disciplines that are eager to get their hands on data we can supply. We need to do a better job of selling the value of that data; primarily because of its quality. Sure you can get elevation data off an Internet search, but how reliable is it and are you willing to assume the liability that comes from using information that doesn't necessarily come from reliable sources?

There are many opportunities at our conference to rub shoulders with your peers, with instructors and PLSO board members. I liken this experience to prospecting. You can mine information from the various sources available, and take away many nuggets pertinent to your specific needs. Where else can you find such lode bearing veins in close proximity to each other?

I look forward to seeing you at the conference in Eugene. I've been doing this for more than 40 years and I come away from every conference enriched in some way. You can too! •

Accomplishments

his column summarizes the activities and accomplishments of PLSO in 2015 as they relate to the four initiatives of the Strategic Plan:

Membership Education and Outreach Advance Legislative Agenda Fiscal Responsibility

Membership

Membership Committee Chair: Gary Anderson

As of the beginning of November, total membership stood at 476. This includes all five categories of membership. With 496 renewed as of this time last year, we stand at 96% of the 2014–2015 cycle.

The Membership Committee, chaired by Gary Anderson, has been active and engaged in 2015 and has held meetings by teleconference on a regular basis.

In the effort to encourage and increase member renewals, chapter leaders were tasked with contacting non-renewed members by phone. Updated non-renewal lists, sorted by chapters, were prepared and sent out by the PLSO office. Phone calls are just one piece of a campaign that also includes web, email and direct mail.

The Membership Committee continues to develop incentives and perks for members. A current PLSO program to benefit members and their families is a prescription drug card and discount purchasing card to Office Depot. Both cards are downloadable from the PLSO website. The drug discount can be as high as 75% and averages around 30%. It can be used as your primary plan and/or be used for drugs not covered by your insurance. Office Depot discounts are received online and in the store. It

also includes printing services. For members located in more rural areas or not near an Office Depot, the website offers free shipping for orders over \$50. Additional programs are being researched. Automatic membership in NSPS gives members discounts on insurance programs, car rentals and tire & wheel purchases.

The PLSO website is always improving. Some of the newer features are pages for job listings and equipment sales; Find a Surveyor; *The Oregon Surveyor* in digital format; Member Resources e-binder; and chapter pages.

Initiative: Recruit and retain Associate Members. This initiative needs to go to the top of the list, given the aging of the surveying community. Associates are the future professionals and the future leaders who will take PLSO through the 21st century. I believe 2016 should be a year of focusing on and developing this initiative. A great starting place is the nascent Young Surveyors of Oregon.


Education and Outreach

Education and Outreach Committee Chair: Lee Spurgeon

TrigStar continues to be a program to get the word out to young people about a cool career opportunity. In 2015, PLSO members proctored the TrigStar test in nine schools. The Oregon state test winner was Zhongxu "Zac" Chen from Valley Catholic High School in Beaverton.

In 2015, various members participated in outreach activities. Umpqua Chapter members attended Explore Engineering and Surveying Evening in Roseburg; Pioneer members represented PLSO in the NW Youth Careers Expo; Willamette Chapter served at a handful of career fairs and 4H events.

PLSO is leading the effort to name a new park in



TwiST: The five-day TwiST Program, given annually in June at Clark College, instructs teachers about geospatial technology and gives them knowledge and tools to take back into the classroom and teach young students. In 2015, PLSO sponsored three Oregon Teachers. NCEES again offered a matching grant to fund half of the teachers' expenses, allowing PLSO and the other participating state societies to sponsor teachers at a bargain rate.

Outreach and Scholarship
Auction: The 2015 auction netted
\$7,414. By vote of the PLSO Board,
the \$2,135 that was designated for
scholarships was deposited into the
OCF fund, and the remaining \$5,279
was applied to the Education &
Outreach budget. The OCF scholarship fund holds more than a quarter
million dollars and produced \$12,160
in dividends available for scholarships.
\$12,000 was awarded in scholarships in
2015. Scholarship Chair is Ben Stacy.

Initiative: Promote Survey Programs in area colleges. I am sad to report that the survey program at Clark College has been cut. Current students will be able to finish their studies, but no new students will be taken in, and the program will

terminate when the last student graduates. When we first learned of the possible cut, I wrote a letter on behalf of PLSO to the college president advocating for the program; but the economics were the deciding factor. In happier news, Pioneer chapter member Tony Brooks has taken on the vacant teaching position in the survey program at Chemeketa College.

PLSO Foundation: After the sudden and tragic death of Foundation champion Sue Newstetter, Aimee McAuliffe, PLSO Exec. Secretary, and I met with a lawyer who specializes in nonprofits to get some insight into how to move forward (or if to move forward). Since a PLSO Foundation would not be for the purpose of scholarships (due to the large amount of money already invested in the OCF fund), the PLSO board is in the midst of researching options.

A presentation by OCF board member Annie Donnely is part of that research. But the fundamental question remains whether the foundation would have a purpose or purposes other than scholarships strong enough to justify the expense and high maintenance required.

Advance Legislative Agenda

Legislative Committee Chair: Dave Williams PLSO Lobbyist Darrell Fuller continues to monitor the legislature in Salem for issues that may impact the profession, work closely with the Legislative Committee and the PLSO office, submit legislative updates for distribution to PLSO members, and schedule a seminar during the conference. It has been a relatively quiet year for PLSO legislative issues. No burning issues requiring legislation have been identified this year. However, two issues came up in 2015 that PLSO acted upon:

• In the Spring, Fuller alerted PLSO to a request by International Union of Operating Engineers/Local 70 to the Oregon Bureau of Labor & Industry (BOLI) to revise the Construction Site Survey Party Chief designation

- to bring it under BOLI's sub classification "Power Equipment Operator" and thus subject to Prevailing Wage. After doing research with other state societies and with American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC) and DEA, PLSO decided to oppose the proposal. Feedback was received from surveyors on both sides of the issue. A meeting attended by parties on both sides of the issue was held to discuss outstanding issues and provide additional information, and ultimately the BOLI Commissioner approved the proposal. It becomes effective January 1, 2016.
- Hydrography: OSBEELS initiated Senate Bill 297 to revise registration qualifications for engineers, land surveyors and photogrammetrists. An amendment, A4, was proposed by ACEC to require all hydrographic surveys to be conducted by professional land surveyors or engineers. At first, PLSO supported the amendment but later withdrew that support. Rep. Paul Holvey, Chair of the house Business & Labor Committee did not support A4, but agreed to a meeting of stakeholders. The meeting was held in Salem on October 1 and was attended by Dave Williams, Lee Spurgeon, John Thatcher and Darrell Fuller. Details were published in the PLSO Oct. E-news. Suffice it to say, there will be more to come, and PLSO will remain involved.

Fiscal Responsibility

PLSO Budget Chair: Gary Johnston

In light of the projected shortfall of \$7,000 in the 2015 budget (due mainly by disappointing proceeds from the conference), steps are being taken to minimize operating expenses, to eliminate some conference expenses that won't impact the quality of the conference, and to increase membership renewal. Steps taken are:

- Aimee McAuliffe has changed the bank account to reduce fees and changed telephone packages to reflect actual usage more accurately The web server was paid in advance to save money in the long run.
- Following the example of LSAW, it has been proposed to eliminate the live auction in 2016 and have a silent auction only. In addition, the PLSO board will donate an auction item, and the chapters have been encouraged to do the same.
- Sponsorships are being sold for the 2016 conference.
- The PLSO Executive Committee will continue to encourage the chapters to hold workshops.

As described above, the chapters have been tasked throughout the year with contacting non-renewed members and getting them renewed.

Conclusion

This is my last column as PLSO Chair. I feel privileged to have been entrusted with this position, and I will continue to serve on the board through 2016 as

The greatest reward for me this past year wasn't scoring the President's Suite at the 2015 conference. Rather it was working with our chapter officers and committee chairs, Aimee McAuliffe, Darrell Fuller, Lisa Switalla, and all the great WESTFED people.

It would give me great pleasure to see the Young Surveyors Network of Oregon grow, thrive and develop young leaders to take PLSO through the next quarter century. I am retiring in 2016, and I plan to stay healthy so I can see that happen—perhaps even help it happen. While all organizations need to tap into the experience and wisdom of their elders, they also need the energy, drive and fresh ideas of their youngsters.

Fall Business Meeting Summary

he NSPS Fall Business Meeting was held during the week of October 6–10, 2015, in Sandusky, Ohio at the Kalahari Resorts & Conventions. The following is a list of initiatives and observations from the meeting:

- The ALTA/NSPS Standards have been approved by both organizations and the new standards will be effective February 23, 2016. This adoption date was selected to honor the anniversary of the Roman God Terminus, protector of boundary markers!
- NSPS will prepare a position statement on U.A.S.
 (unmanned aircraft systems) regulations and operations.
 We've also signed on with other mapping organizations in crafting a letter to urge the F.A.A. to codify, in a more urgent manner, the government's regulations for operating this technology.
- The Young Surveyors group had a productive meeting and has started thinking about bylaws, sub committees and addressing tasks that many have offered up for them to consider. Approximately 11 of them attended the Board of Directors meeting on Friday. Oregon's young surveyor, Chris Glantz, was in attendance.
- We intend to broaden the awareness of the Young Surveyors and our National Society at educational institutions across the country by inviting a student to attend our meetings and write a short review that will be shared with all surveying programs. The program will be administered by the Young Surveyors and funded through NSPS Board of Director donations. We intend to have a student in attendance at the 2017 spring meeting.
- Our president, Jon Warren, and president-elect Tony Cavell, have each made a significant effort to re-align our committees and offer specific charges for these committees to work on.
- The Director from Alaska requested support regarding the setting of monuments by the BLM when creating Townships that would be further subdivided and sold by the State of Alaska. BLM is proposing subdivision of open lands in Alaska with coordinates and no monuments. BLM referred to the process as "bearing trees in the sky!" NSPS Government Affairs Committee will review and comment on the matter.
- Certified Survey Technicians (CSTs) at all levels and existing membership can have their annual certification fee waived by maintaining a membership in NSPS.

- The NSPS Joint Government Affairs Committee shoulders a great deal of responsibility in representing surveyors across the nation on Capitol Hill. Please review their report for the many tasks and/or accomplishments they have had over the last six months. Mr. Pat Smith, Chair of the Committee, requested direction from the Board of Directors on the following matters:
 - NSPS will provide a position statement on the PHMSA (Pipeline Hazardous Materials Safety Agency) Proposed Rule which contains a number of references to surveying and mapping- and provide a standardized position to our state affiliates
 - NSPS will provide a position statement to the House Financial Services Committee which is considering modifications to the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), either to implement an improved working process or privatize the effort
 - NSPS supports the addition of the Small Business Administration (SBA) to Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) Council- given that many small businesses are effected by FAR regulations.
- During the meeting, Curt Sumner presented to the Board the issue with Hydrographers request in Oregon to be exempt or receive a special license to practice surveying without meeting the minimum qualifications or being examined. The majority response from the directors in attendance was what Hydrographers in Oregon are requesting is the practice of land surveying. NSPS Joint Government Affairs Committee is prepared to assist the Oregon membership with this issue if PLSO requests their assistance.
- The NSPS 100% Membership Program has been very successful. We currently have 47 states and the District of Columbia participating, just under 17,000 members, and continue to offer our help to those still considering the program.
- We continue to collaborate with NGS and participate in quarterly meetings on various initiatives
- We are designated by ABET as the Lead Society among its professional organization members for evaluating Surveying Programs seeking either initial accreditation, or renewed accreditation. Currently, NSPS evaluates 31 such programs.

In many cases the hindsight only shows up to tell us that we made the right decision and without that decision we would have never been able to create positive new experiences.

This year's conference is stepping away from the comfort and familiarity of the Salem Conference Center to return to the Emerald City of Eugene. Here we will be graciously hosted by the Hilton Hotel and Resort and some members will recall that this isn't the first time the PLSO has held a conference there. I am reminded by those PLSO members with a lot more grey hairs than I, that we were at the Hilton many moons ago and that change is a good thing every once in a while. We on the conference committee feel the same way and would like to present to you, our members, another outstanding lineup of both new and familiar presentations.

We have had the schedule online since early November and hope that you have had a chance to review the great topics that will be presented. To get the best answer to that question you should plan on attending Susan Wooley's presentation from BOLI. Her bio is on the conference website and she will be here to *help* us with questions we may have related to this change.

Hydrographic Surveying: Overview and Current Licensing Requirements

Hydrographic surveying is a rapidly growing field of surveying and mapping that encompasses underwater remote sensing techniques. Examples include bathymetric surveying, side-scan sonar mapping, sub-bottom profiling, acoustic current measurements, acoustic scanning and geomagnetic sensing. The Oregon Court of Appeals decided Hardy v. State Land Board in October 2015, concluding that the Rogue River is navigable and state-owned downstream from Lost Creek Dam. Bricker represents the petitioners, landowners who challenged the state's assertion of ownership. Jennie will give the backstory behind this litigation and provide an overview of the legal issues affecting ownership of submerged and submersible lands in Oregon.

Height Modernization Surveys with OPUS— Projects and Atmospheric Effects on GNSS Positioning SPEAKERS: Dan Gillins, Jihye Park

In 2014, NGS released a web-based tool named OPUS—Projects for processing multiple static GPS observations involving multiple marks. This seminar presents an empirical research study on the accuracy of OPUS-Projects and compares its results with results obtained using Trimble Business Center (TBC). It discusses best practices for processing GPS data in OPUS-Projects and shows how OPUS-Projects can be implemented for modernizing heights on dozens of benchmarks to a vertical accuracy of 2 cm or less at the 95% confidence level. Although it is possible to obtain centimeter-level accuracy with GNSS, this seminar will also show that abnormal ionospheric behaviors, such as ionospheric scintillation at low/high latitudes or strong ionospheric gradient, can significantly degrade GNSS positioning capabilities. It then presents a strategy for mitigating error in severe ionospheric environments.

Skinner Butte

Within walking distance of downtown Eugene, Skinner Butte and the surrounding park offers a place to relax in the midst of the metro area. Stroll along the Willamette on the riverfront bike path, hike to the top of the butte for a spectacular view of Eugene or take a rest in the shady park. The past comes alive at the replica of Eugene and Mary Skinner's 1846 cabin, the first pioneer structure in the area. This new interpretive area coincided with the 150th anniversary of the Applegate Trail. (Drive by or allow 30 minutes at the cabin)

Owen Rose Garden

This park along the Willamette River is home to over 4,500 varieties of summer blooming roses. The famous Black Republican Cherry tree is also in the garden. 




